We remember the resurrection; we look outside around us and we see things becoming green and alive after a long winter. Spring is when we can see God doing a new thing the easiest. I don't know if you see it, but God is doing a new thing at Knox too. The great part about that new thing, is that we can see it if we are paying attention. I always want to be careful, too much new is scary, but to not see God moving us to something that might be useful for Christ's Kingdom isn't wise ether.
