




History of Music at Knox Presbyterian Church, Listowel, Ontario



Introduction

In the earliest days of Knox Church there was no instrument, no choir, and a precenter alone led the responsive singing of psalms or paraphrases. At some point during the 1880's a hymnal was introduced which added to the "interest of the praise service". The first selection sung from this hymnal was "Onward Christian Soldiers". It is unknown when a choir was actually first formed; however, in a very brief order of service from the mid 1890s, it lists "Anthem – Selected". The early use of the word "anthem" was to describe a type of responsive singing between soloist and choir with instrumental accompaniment, so it is unclear if this was a special selection by just the choir or if it might refer to the selection of hymns or psalms for the service as there is no mention of those in the order of service.

In 1888, Miss Margaret Sutherland, who was a young teenager at the time, began as organist when Knox's first pipe organ was installed in the newly-built sanctuary. The position of choir leader was also introduced at this time, but the earliest records pertaining to choir leaders (also referred to as precenters) date back only as far as 1899: Miss Hay (1899); W.R. Dunn (1900-1902); Walter Hardwick (1903 – 1908); C.M. Scott (1909-1910); Lila M. Thompson (1911 – 1915); Blanche Stevens (1917). According to the 1914 historical book, Margaret worked "in harmony with every choir leader" and was described as a "tower of strength to the congregation in the service of praise and has few equals as an organist".

In 1912, the session expressed their thankfulness to the current choir leader, Lila M. Thompson for her "arduous labours in helping to make the hours of public praise and worship helpful and pleasant, and would recommend all who have the gift of song to take an active interest in the praise service of the congregation." The 1914 historical report describes the choir as being "large and efficient". In 1915, Lila Thompson expressed

her appreciation for the congregation's support in raising funds through donations and various events to purchase choir gowns.

It was in 1919 when the choir was formally organized:

"The choir was organized February 12th, 1919, with 29 members and three honorary members. During the year we have gained 15 members and lost 10, leaving a membership of 34.

Under the leadership of Miss Sutherland the Choir has made steady progress and the attendance at practice as well as church services has been good.

Special music has been rendered at different times during the year and a concert was held in the church on the evening of Good Friday and was well patronized by the congregation."

At this time the separate positions of organist and choir leader were combined into one. Margaret took on this new position, receiving the added salary of choir leader (\$300) in addition to the organist salary of \$250. Under the sole direction of Margaret Sutherland, the choir provided the vocal leadership for the singing of hymns and as a group they began raising funds to purchase music to sing. Their aim was "to assist in every way to make the music a real help to the Minister and Congregation". To raise funds, the choir presented a concert once or twice a year, usually in April or December. Often there was a soloist or group hired to perform in the concerts, and at one time they paid \$4.00 to have a piano moved in for a concert. Some of the choir funds were used for the choir's social events and/or presentations for choir members moving away or retiring from the choir.

The organ at Knox had also undergone a recent change. The original pipe organ required air to be pumped into the pipes in order to generate sound. An individual was employed to manually pump the organ bellows by continually pushing down on a pair of levers. In 1900 this job paid \$12.00 per year and by 1917 the salary had increased

to \$25.00. In 1918 a new mechanical organ blower was installed for \$285.00, and it was no longer necessary to pump the organ manually. With a continuous supply of air flowing through the pipes, the organ would have a reliable, constant sound.

Music was also an important part of the Sunday School opening and closing exercises. In 1906 Sunday School was held in the sanctuary at 2:30 p.m. There was an organist or pianist hired to play who was paid \$15.00 per year; and the organ pumper was paid extra when needed. A youth orchestra was also organized by Mr. F.M. Kay "providing the Sabbath School with excellent music in our service of praise."


The choir already had gowns (purchased in 1915); collars added in 1920 (made by the Ladies' Aid Group).


- Good Friday Concert in 1919 raised \$108.50
- Choir rehearsals were Friday nights at 8:00 p.m.
- Began singing special music during worship services
- Choir continued presenting concerts once or twice a year
- Mrs. A. J. (Hazel) Hamilton was a paid soloist in the choir




- In 1929 "the Concert of the year was The Gypsy Rover" (a musical written in 1919). The concert was put on for 2 nights in Listowel and then repeated in Harriston, Palmerston and Arthur. They raised over \$435.00, which is the equivalent of approx. \$6,500.00 today.
- Hymnbooks with music were purchased in 1929 for \$36.77

Ladies Aid paid for the new organ over the next 5 years

- In the annual report of 1930 the choir made a request for the choir loft to be renovated as the "seating capacity is taxed to the utmost many times and not conducive to comfort". The choir then transferred \$100.00 into the building fund.
- In 1931 after another successful concert was presented twice in Listowel and repeated in Harrison, the choir purchased new collars and caps for the choir (which only the ladies wore), and a rack to store the caps.
- An afternoon "tea" was held for Margaret Sutherland in 1933.
- A "presentation" was made to Margaret Sutherland when she retired in 1935 to show their "appreciation of her loyal and efficient services for so many years."


- Choir practices moved to Thursday evenings
- Presented the play "Princess O'Toole"; raised over \$655.00 and paid \$2.50 in royalties
- A choir banquet was held
- New choir gowns, collars and hats
- Bessie Jobb had a rule that every person who sang in the choir would sing a solo at some point.
- Since 1920 it had been the custom of the choir to make presentations to members who move away or retire from the choir. The last time this is mentioned in the choir reports was in 1946.

Social Events

- In 1947 the choir was entertained to a dinner at the Royal Hotel, followed by a social evening by Mr. D.P. Savage (Sunday School Superintendent)
- In August the choir had a picnic in Port Elgin



The Cupidores

This singing group of young women from Knox Choir was formed in 1950 and led by Bessie Jobb. Their first performance was with a male trio named "The Commodores" who put on a concert at Knox, and thus the name "Cupidores" was chosen by the girls. Practices were held at Bessie's apartment at 7:30 a.m. so that everyone could get to school or work.

The group performed at church socials, services and local concerts. Their repertoire was varied with songs like "I Passed by Your Window", "Come to the Fair", spirituals, and lighter songs such as "Never Been Kissed".

Most of the girls made their own gowns with the stipulation that they be any colour as long as they were pastel shades. When singing for a strawberry social at Cromarty Presbyterian Church the only place for the girls to change into their gowns was the coal cellar. The group certainly had a lot of fun while managing to change without getting their dresses dirty!

The group reluctantly disbanded in 1952 when three members left to train as nurses; three went to Teacher's College; and the other girls resumed their various jobs.

1955 – Junior Choir formed; leaders Sandra Nickel (Arlein) and Joyce Willis; 70 members (ages 8 – 15), sang for a number of organizations, appeared twice on television and led the praise at the Christmas Eve service; also sang at the wedding of their pianist, Joyce Willis to Bob Nickel

1958 – Junior choir sang the 3rd Sunday of every month and Christmas evening service.



- For 2 years (1953 & 1954)
 "scotch tape" is listed as an expenditure at \$20 (needed to repair anthem books)
- Following the renovation of the choir loft, the choir now processed in through the front doors on either side of the loft.
- The annual choir Christmas party held in Sunday School room (gifts exchanged; games played and lunch served)
- In 1955, Carillonic Bells were installed in the church tower



- Major work done on the organ
- Annual Christmas Eve services began in 1964
- New Junior Choir gowns purchased (Yellow-gold)
- A new piano purchased in 1965 by Ladies' Aid group "made it possible for organ and piano duets to be played at services".
- To mark Canada's Centennial a community service was held on July 2, 1967 at the Listowel arena, led by Knox's minister Rev. David Crawford and Knox Choir; Marjorie Crawford played the organ (which was brought in for the event).
- Bessie Jobb retired in 1967.
 She was honoured by Session for her faithful service, gifts were presented by the Music Committee, and the choir gathered at a local restaurant to pay tribute to Bessie's 25+ years as organist and choir leader at Knox.




Children's choir sang the first verse of a children's hymn each Sunday

- Adult choir membership built back up, although there is this note from the 1972 choir report: "We still need more men to sing in the back row".
- \$1,200.00 was raised to purchase new choir gowns (Blue)
- From the 1972 Session report "We are grateful to Mrs. Fagan for the excellent leadership and training she is giving the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Choirs. We also commend the choir members for their faithful attendance and hard work."
- To mark the Centennial of the Town of Listowel in 1975, a community service was held at Knox on June 29th with a large reunion choir of former and current members formed for the occasion. Anthems for the service were: "God So Loved the World" (Stainer), "Old One-Hundredth" (Vaughan Williams), "Praise Ye the Lord" (Rutter) "Sussex Mummer's Carol" (Vaughan Williams)
- From 1975 to 1977 the choir presented "A Gift of Music" program on Christmas Eve which was very popular with large attendances. A favourite Christmas song was "Mary's Little Boy Chile".

- To commemorate 100 years since the sanctuary was built an old-fashioned service was held in 1987. The congregation remained seated during the singing of hymns as they were led by Brian Emery in the role of precenter.
- In 1989 two Hand Bell groups were formed. The adult group was directed by Brian Emery and the children's group was directed by Kelly Henderson.






The Crosstones

In the early 2000's four young singers from Knox formed a group and began singing occasionally during church services. The original members of the group were: Lauren Johns, Heather Johnston, Nicole Kaufman, and Alicia Lockie, accompanied and directed by Agnes Henderson. The girls felt they needed a name for their group and it was Nicole's mom who suggested "The Crosstones". After a few years Karli Purcell also joined the group adding another strong voice.

Their repertoire consists of contemporary Christian and mainstream songs. Over the years the girls sang during worship services at Knox and at various community events:




